## History

PIC has a long history...44 years old

PIC was opened in 1978 by UPenn for infants and toddlers because they didn't serve the younger children. One year later they decided to close and a group of parents got together to create an independent non profit child care program.

In 2007, long time Executive Director Marni Sweet passed away after an illness. Under Marni, PIC expanded with the goal of making PIC more socio-economically diverse, something that was very important to her.

Upon Marni's death, the \$1M Sweet Dreams capital campaign was launched to expand further to meet the growing needs for child care in the neighborhood. The Sweet Building (on the left as you walk down the driveway) was renovated to create 6 new classrooms, increasing the program by 30% (50 new children)

In 2013 we redid the Nature Playground where we connect children with nature in as many ways as possible. Areas were created for playing in sand and dirt, building with loose parts and jumping among logs, playing with big blocks and big sticks and doing outside art. The Nature Playground has been an important part of staying open during the pandemic.

In 2017 PIC expanded again to increase socio-economic diversity further. We added two new classrooms with approximately 42 new preschool slots (with 50% dedicated to low-income families).

# COVID

PIC closed for four months during COVID. We were fortunate to have parent physicians who volunteered their time to be a part of our COVID TASK force, bringing strong medical guidance to our re-opening. Since that time, guidelines have changed and they continue to do so. We are grateful for the partnership we have with families as we navigate COVID.

#### **Board of Directors**

PIC is a non-profit and thus governed by a Board of Directors that has fiduciary responsibility for the Center. The Board is made up of current and alumni families, and community members. They help set tuition.

NAEYC is national accreditation that is regarded as the mark of highest quality. Only 10 - 13 % centers are accredited across the country. Our last reaccreditation was last year and we are reaccredited every 5 years
